## TACKLING THE BLIGHT OF FLY-TIPPING THE CLA'S FIVE POINT PLAN

Rural Britain is facing a surge in fly-tipping. Almost two thirds of farmers and landowners are affected each year, with some targeted multiple times each month. This results in a vicious cycle of costly clean-ups by the victims who bear the burden of waste crime. We need to take action to tackle this blight on our beautiful countryside, a crime which causes financial damage to victims. The CLA has set out a five-point action plan for how government, farmers, landowners and rural communities can work together to fight back.
